The Word This Week

We will spend most of the Sundays of the coming year in the company of Saint Matthew. His Gospel (like the others has its own characteristics. He is writing for a Jewish audience, and so is always at pains to stress one thing: that Jesus of Nazareth was the promised Messiah. He does this by reference to Jesus' teaching and miracles, and very often by quoting the prophecies of the Old Testament to show that Jesus was their fulfilment. Today is a perfect example. "Zebulun and Naphthali" was an old name for the area round Capernaum by the side of the Lake of Galilee, a busy fishing and trading area, with many Gentile towns and settlements: it is here, rather than in the dangerous town of Nazareth, that Jesus 'settles' and begins his ministry. This is where the proclamation of the Kingdom of God begins, as was foretold, and the first followers are invited to join Jesus.

Sunday of the Word of God

Today through the world we celebrate the "Sunday of the Word of God". It's an opportunity for us to think about how God's Word impacts our daily lives – whether that is the bible readings we hear at Sunday or weekday Mass, or our own daily reading of Scripture. The Bible can be a bit forbidding sometimes – we pick it up and with the best will in the world come away from our reading more confused than ever! Nevertheless we should never give up on the scriptures: first, find a translation that you can understand; then, don't try too hard to look for meaning – let it come to you. And always, if you aren't sure, feel free to ask someone (like your parish priest!) for help!

Caritas Sunday

Caritas Sunday, which takes place this Sunday, is an important date in the annual calendar. It's an opportunity for people across Greater Manchester and Lancashire to reflect on the social action work which has taken place in their local communities over the last year. Parishes, community groups and individuals hold collections and make donations in support of that work across Greater Manchester and Lancashire. Demand for our services is continuing to increase as the continued high costs of living continue to hit

families and individuals hard. We'd like to say thank you for your support and donations, which mean we can continue to work alongside thousands of local people every year, at a time when they need us the most. There will be a retiring collection for Caritas after Masses this weekend, so please be generous as always!

Holocaust Memorial Day

The theme for Holocaust Memorial Day on Tuesday is 'Bridging Generations'. This is a call-to-action. A reminder that the responsibility of remembrance doesn't end with the survivors – it lives on through their children, their grandchildren and through all of us. This theme encourages us all to engage actively with the past – to listen, to learn and to carry those lessons forward. By doing so, we build a bridge between memory and action, between history and hope for the future. Please pray for all victims of the holocaust, their families and especially their descendants.

Racial Justice Sunday

Parish Census

As you will know from last week we are conducting a new Parish Census: a parish census is an important tool for a Roman Catholic community because it helps the parish understand and better serve its members. By gathering accurate information about households, ages, and sacramental status, the parish can plan pastoral care, liturgies, catechesis, and outreach more effectively. The census strengthens communication between parishioners and clergy, ensuring that no one feels overlooked, especially the elderly, sick, or new families. It also supports responsible stewardship by guiding the use of resources and facilities. Ultimately, a parish census helps build a more connected, welcoming, and faith-filled community centred on Christ and the mission of the Church. It will not be used for indiscriminate "marketing" or be passed on to any third party. This is not a geographical survey, so if you live outside Saint Vincent's, but still consider this to be your parish, please fill in a form! If you know of someone who is a Catholic living in this parish, but who does not attend Church, please feel free to ask (respectfully and without pressure!) if they would also like to be included in the Parish Census. Relics of Saint Carlo Acutis to Visit Diocese

This month, the relics of Saint Carlo Acutis will be hosted at two of our churches over five days, during which time the Diocese will welcome schools, parishioners and people from all over for veneration. Carlo is the first millennial saint, and is celebrated for his profound faith and his use of the internet to log Eucharistic miracles from around the world. He was passionate about spreading the teachings of the Catholic Church up until his death from leukaemia at

the age of 15. The relics will be presented at Saint Mary's Church, Burnley from **28th-29th January** before they travel to Saint Patrick's Church, Collyhurst from **30th January to 1st February**. Women of the Old Testament

29: Susannah

The story of Susannah and the wicked elders is one of my favourite parts of the Bible, though I have to confess to first coming across it, not in the Bible, but in a collection of "Historical Detective Stories". This is because is it one of the earliest crime dramas and features the first example of forensic questioning after a crime. Susannah is a beautiful young woman, who is subjected to the unwanted advances of two elders - powerful men in the community. She rebuffs their advances but in retaliation for this rejection they accuse her of adultery with an unknown man. The penalty for this is death. Susannah is powerless against these influential men, and it seems that this false accusation will prevail. But God sends his prophet, Daniel, to look into the case. Daniel questions each elder separately, and when their stories do not agree, gets the case thrown out, thereby saving Susannah's life. While this story is completely fictional, it is trying to make a point: God is on the side of the innocent, the victim, the oppressed, the falsely accused. When the wickedness of the powerful is at work, God is with the victim. It is interesting that Susannah is, in some ways, a prefiguration of Jesus - the innocent one, falsely accused, who is our God come to be with all who fall victim to abuse and cruelty and do not have a Daniel to save them.
