HARD OF HEARING? There is an Induction Loop System installed in this Church: if you wear a hearing aid, please turn it to the 'T' setting.

Refreshments after Mass: Everyone is very welcome to stay behind after Sunday morning Masses and share a cuppa! Tea and Coffee are served in the Parish Centre on the opposite side of the carpark after 9.00 a.m. and 11.00 a.m. Sunday Masses.

Toilets: The toilet is located near the side entrance: children should not go out of Church unaccompanied. Please use the disinfectant wipes to clean all surfaces after every use—dispose of them in the bin but do not flush them down the toilet. Thank you.

THE WORD THIS WEEK

It's often the case that the "values of the Gospel" contradict the "values of the World" - sometimes to the extent that the one is the exact opposite of the other. Today is a typical example: greatness and prominence, success and victory, these are goals that the world has very clear ideas about. The Gospel, however, redefines them: Gospel success is Worldly failure: the Gospel's way of greatness is the World's life of service; and what the World sees as death and failure is in fact life and victory. It's this contrast that we see in the Gospel reading today, where out of a possibly innocent (but possibly sycophantic) question, a debate emerges about prominence and greatness. Jesus makes it clear that his greatness is different to that sought "among the pagans" - he will give his very life, and so become the first of all. We should take his words about the "worldly way of behaving" to heart: "This is not to happen among you."

World Mission Sunday

Today is World Mission Sunday in the Catholic Church. It is our chance to show love and solidarity to our brothers and sisters overseas who share our faith. In offering our prayers, we join with missionaries everywhere in communion and compassion to support them in spreading the Good News, and by giving a donation we respond to Christ's call to feed the hungry and clothe the naked. There will be a retiring collection after all Masses this weekend, and your donations will go, in their entirety, to support churches, hospitals, schools and vocations in countries where the Church is new, young or poor. The idea is that we now bring that prayerful pondering to a Parish meeting, to see what proposals we can contribute to the process. The first meeting is this coming Thursday 24th October at 7.00 p.m. There will be a second meeting to consider themes 3 and 4 in December. Everyone is very welcome.

WHAT'S IN A CHURCH? 8: The Baptismal Font

A new series where we will look at the various parts of our Church to understand their history, meaning and significance in our liturgy and devotion.

Few items of church furniture have wandered around as much as the font - and I'm not just talking about ours here at Saint Vincent's! In medieval churches you will normally find the font near the main entrance - this was because baptism is our "entrance" into the family of the Church. A relic of this is holy water stoups by the doors, where we can still remember our Baptism every time we enter Church. If you go back further, however, baptismal fonts were often in completely separate buildings



(such as the Cathedrals in Pisa or Florence). And if you go back further still, they were lakes and rivers! The font is above all a convenient way of bringing water into Church to celebrate baptism. Ideally it should be a pool big enough to baptise by "full immersion"

- some newer Churches, especially in the States, are now equipped with fonts that can accommodate this! There are many examples of such fonts from the earliest centuries (the one illustrated is the 6th century baptismal pool from Belkata in Tunisia). The Rite of Baptism has many deep symbolisms, but one of the most important is that through baptism we die and rise again with Christ. Whether immersed in water or with water poured over our head, emerging from the water is a sign of that personal resurrection, our new life and new birth as a member of Christ.


SALFORD DIOCESAN SYNOD PRAYER

NEXT SUNDAY'S GOSPEL

Mark 10:46-52

As Jesus left Jericho with his disciples and a large crowd, Bartimaeus (that is, the son of Timaeus), a blind beggar, was sitting at the side of the road. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout and to say, 'Son of David, Jesus, have pity on me.' And many of them scolded him and told him to keep quiet, but he only shouted all the louder, 'Son of David, have pity on me.' Jesus stopped and said, 'Call him here.' So they called the blind man. 'Courage,' they said 'get up; he is calling you.' So throwing off his cloak, he jumped up and went to Jesus. Then Jesus spoke, 'What do you want me to do for you?' 'Rabbuni,' the blind man said to him 'Master, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has saved you.' And immediately his sight returned and he followed him along the road.



THE SACRAMENTS

Home Communions

Brenda Robinson is our Parish Coordinator for Home Communions: if you or a relative find yourself housebound for a period of time, or know of a Catholic moving into one of our care homes, and would like to receive holy communion at home, please let Brenda know by phoning **0785 559 8016**.

Baptisms

are by appointment: please collect, fill in and return one of the Information forms from the porch. They provide details of what is required and the next steps in the process.

Marriage

is also by appointment. Please take an information leaflet from the porch and return the tear-off portion to arrange an interview. Please do not make bookings before this interview and note that six months' notice is required.

Anointing of the Sick

Please call the Presbytery to ask for this Sacrament. It should not be left until the last minute, but the sick should celebrate this sacrament to receive God's healing and comfort.

Confirmation and First Holy Communion

Children baptised in the Catholic Church who are in Year 3 (First Communion), and Year 8 (Confirmation) but NOT at Saint Vincent's Primary School, please ask Father James for registration forms as soon as possible.
