HARD OF HEARING? There is an Induction Loop System installed in this Church: if you wear a hearing aid, please turn it to the 'T' setting.

Refreshments after Mass: Everyone is very welcome to stay behind after Sunday morning Masses and share a cuppa! Tea and Coffee are served in the Parish Centre on the opposite side of the carpark after 9.00 a.m. and 11.00 a.m. Sunday Masses.

Toilets: The toilet is located near the side entrance: **children should not go out of Church unaccompanied.** Please use the disinfectant wipes to clean all surfaces after every use—dispose of them in the bin but do not flush them down the toilet. Thank you.

THE WORD THIS WEEK

All of Jesus' miracles can be read in many different ways: there is always a message – almost a parable - behind each one, that tells us something about God, about his care for his people, about Jesus and about the promises God has made to us, his children. Today is no excep-tion: on the simplest level, we see Jesus offering the greatest gift he could give to Bartimaeus ☐ the gift of sight. It shows us Jesus' love and care for those who suffer. But that alone is not the whole meaning of this story, as the first reading makes clear: there, through Jeremiah, God promises to gather his children into a new and perfect Kingdom, washing away the tears and restoring comfort. So Jesus appears as a fulfilment of this prophecy, as the One who brings this Kingdom into the world. But it doesn't end there: in our own age we still have the blind, and those who suffer: there are still tears to be washed away - Jesus' work is begun, but not completed. God's promises extend to us as well. As followers of Jesus, we should imitate him in doing what we can to bring that comfort which is the Kingdom of God to all in need.

NEWS AND NOTES

A New Papal Encyclical

On Thursday the Vatican published the latest encyclical from Pope Francis, entitled "Dilexit Nos." The Holy Father has frequently talked about the importance of encounter. In Dilexit Nos, he explains how our lifestyle today, with its frenetic pace and its emphasis on consumerism means that we are not paying enough attention to the heart. He returns to his theme of the dangers of individualism, telling us that this stops us from having a true encounter with our neighbour. This leads to the realisation that an authentic personal relationship to Christ, strengthened by devotion to the Sacred Heart cannot be separated from loving our neighbour. More on this next week!

All Hallows' Eve

Otherwise known as Halloween! Nowadays there is often a lot of debate about whether Christians should "celebrate" Halloween: we must remember that it is originally a Christian idea, connected with the great celebration of All the Saints and All the Faithful Departed that follow it! The following is from an article written by an American priest, Father Steve Grunow: "There is a lot that is unsavoury about the contemporary celebration of Halloween. What does the singular focus on violence, horror, and death have to say about our culture? The traditional, Catholic Halloween placed these realities within the context of Christ's victory over sin, death, and evil. The current secularized version of the festival has no salvific content and has been loosed from its theological moorings. But what is the proper response? To lock the Church behind closed doors - or to let her out into the world? I think it is time for Catholics to accept

the religious liberties that this culture claims to afford them and go public with their own festivals—and to do so dramatically and with a great deal of public fervour. What is holding us back? What are we afraid will happen? Halloween should not be a day when our churches go dark and Christians retreat into the shadows, but when we fill the darkness with Christ's light and go out into the culture, inviting everyone to the prepare for the festival of the saints with all the joy we can muster."

Holy Day of Obligation

This coming **Friday 1st November** is the Solemnity of All Saints, a holy day of obligation. It's rather like an extra Sunday in the middle of the week, when we celebrate by attending Mass, but also observing it as a festival day: since it falls on a Friday this year, there is no fasting and abstinence as we normally have on Fridays! Masses here at Saint Vincent's are both on Friday, at **9.30 a.m. and 6.30 p.m.**

On **Saturday 2nd November** (All Souls' Day) Mass will be offered in Rochdale Cemetery Chapel for those buried or cremated there and all our departed brothers and sisters. The Mass will be at **11.00 a.m.** and all are welcome.

First, this coming week will see new floodlighting installed in the car-park and paths round Church - especially important now the clocks have gone back! Secondly, the sacristy is going to be moved, so that we can create a room for Children's Liturgy of the Word at Sunday masses from the present sacristy: this work will take a little longer, but it is hoped that it will be completed early in the New Year. WHAT'S IN A CHURCH? 9: The Holy Oils

We keep finding some unusual words as we travel round the Church, and this week is no exception! Today we are visiting what is sometimes called the "aumbry" - the place of reservation of the Holy Oils used in the Sacraments. "Aumbry" is an old English word, which comes from the Latin 'armarium" which simply means "closet" or "cupboard" - it also gives us the French word "armoire", sometimes used for a wardrobe. In older churches the Holy Oils would be stored in a secure cupboard - similar to a Tabernacle, but smaller - on the Sanctuary; nowadays many Churches have the oils on display, either on the sanctuary or in the baptistry - as we now do! The Holy Oils are kept because in normal circumstances they are to be used for a whole year, only being blessed by the Bishop at the Chrism Mass in Holy Week. The most important is the Sacred Chrism, olive oil mixed with balsam, which is used in Baptism, Confirmation, Ordination of Priests and the Dedication of Churches. Then is the Oil of Catechumens (or of Baptism), which is only used to anoint those preparing to be baptised. Finally there is the Oil of the Sick, used for the seriously ill in the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. A priest can bless olive oil to replace the last two if they run out, but the Chrism can only be blessed by a Bishop. The Oils are a constant reminder of the sacramental life of the Church, and the way in which physical things and human touch become the healing and strengthening touch of God's grace. 
Memorial Mass

NEXT SUNDAY'S GOSPEL

Mark 12:28-34

One of the scribes came up to Jesus and put a question to him, 'Which is the first of all the commandments?' Jesus replied, 'This is the first: Listen, Israel, the Lord our God is the one Lord, and you must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind and with all your strength. The second is this: You must love your neighbour as yourself. There is no commandment greater than these.' The scribe said to him, 'Well spoken, Master; what you have said is true: that he is one and there is no other. To love him with all your heart, with all your understanding and strength, and to love your neighbour as yourself, this is far more important than any holocaust or sacrifice.' Jesus, seeing how wisely he had spoken, said, 'You are not far from the kingdom of God.' And after that no one dared to question him any more.



THE SACRAMENTS

Home Communions

Baptisms

are by appointment: please collect, fill in and return one of the Information forms from the porch. They provide details of what is required and the next steps in the process.

Marriage

is also by appointment. Please take an information leaflet from the porch and return the tear-off portion to arrange an interview. Please do not make bookings before this interview and note that six months' notice is required.

Anointing of the Sick

Please call the Presbytery to ask for this Sacrament. It should not be left until the last minute, but the sick should celebrate this sacrament to receive God's healing and comfort.

Confirmation and First Holy Communion

Children baptised in the Catholic Church who are in **Year 3 (First Communion)**, and **Year 8 (Confirmation)** but NOT at Saint Vincent's Primary School, please ask Father James for registration forms as soon as possible.
