HARD OF HEARING? There is an Induction Loop System installed in this Church: if you wear a hearing aid, please turn it to the 'T' setting.

Refreshments after Mass: Everyone is very welcome to stay behind after Sunday morning Masses and share a cuppa! Tea and Coffee are served in the Parish Centre on the opposite side of the carpark after 9.00 a.m. and 11.00 a.m. Sunday Masses.

Toilets: The toilet is located near the side entrance: **children should not go out of Church unaccompanied.** Please use the disinfectant wipes to clean all surfaces after every use—dispose of them in the bin but do not flush them down the toilet. Thank you.

THE WORD THIS WEEK

After our brief excursion last week into Saint John's Gospel, we are back on track this week with Saint Luke - whom we will follow for the rest of the year. Today is about beginnings: the beginning of Jesus' public ministry. It begins with the Word of God, in the synagogue. Jesus reads from the Old Testament, as we do every Sunday, and tells the people that it is fulfilled in him. Everything that God has said to his people, through his prophets, comes together in Jesus, the Incarnate Word of God. Today is an ideal Sunday to think about the ministry of reader about how our readers we make present' the same fulfilment, Jesus, when they read the word of God in our Churches.

NEWS AND NOTES

Sunday of the Word of God

The Sunday of the Word of God is a profoundly pastoral initiative with which Pope Francis wants to make it clear how important it is in the daily life of the Church and our communities to refer to the Word of God, a Word that is not confined to a book, but which remains ever alive and becomes a concrete and tangible sign. The motto chosen by the Holy Father for 2025, within the Jubilee Year, is a verse from Psalm 119, "I hope in your Word". Pope Francis suggests, "[M]ay you have the habit of always carrying a small Gospel in your pocket, in your bag, to be able to read it during the day". There are several editions of the New Testament or the Gospel, in handy little volumes, pocket versions, that easily fit in our bags or backpacks and that we can carry with us at all times. Or one can easily have the Bible in their cell phone to consult it at any time: there are different apps and websites in different languages, not only with the Bible but also with the Holy Mass readings for each day, pages to read or listen to the Word of God, or commentaries and reflections of the same. One can also use notifications as a reminder to have a moment a day to encounter God's Word, so that it accompanies us wherever we go!

Today is Caritas Sunday

Caritas – putting love into action – is more than an act; it is the very heart of our faith in action, the living embodiment of our call to love God and our neighbour, not just in words but through real, meaningful actions. When we offer our love through practical and financial support, we bring to life the teachings of our Lord, Jesus Christ, who came "not to be served, but to serve" (Mark 10:45). In doing so, we don't just serve those in need; we also enrich our spiritual lives and strengthen the bonds within our community. As a charity, Caritas Salford is only able to operate because of people like you who choose to support their work. Without you – their day centres at Caritas Cornerstone, Lalley Centre, Red Door, the supported accommodation projects at Caritas Maryvale, Morning Star and Caritas House - would close, and they would not be able to carry out their work in schools, and through the Bishop's Fund. So, however you choose to help, through your prayers or by pledging to leave a gift in your Will; by making a one-off donation, or by setting up a monthly direct debit, please understand what a difference you are making to local people.

Pope Francis on the Jubilee

From the Bull of Indiction of the Holy Year: "Hope, together with faith and charity, makes up the triptych of the "theological virtues" that express the heart of the Christian life (cf. 1 Corinthians 13:13; 1 Thessalonians 1:3). In their inseparable unity, hope is the virtue that, so to speak, gives inward direction and purpose to the life of believers. For this reason, the Apostle Paul encourages us to "rejoice in hope, be patient in suffering, and persevere in prayer" (Romans 12:12). Surely we need to "abound in hope" (cf. Romans 15:13), so that we may bear credible and attractive witness to the faith and love that dwell in our hearts; that our faith may be joyful and our charity enthusiastic; and that each of us may be able to offer a smile, a small gesture of friendship, a kind look, a ready ear, a good deed, in the knowledge that, in the Spirit of Jesus, these can become, for those who receive them, rich seeds of hope. Yet what is the basis of our hope? To understand this, let us stop and reflect on "the reasons for our hope" (cf. 1 Peter 3:15)."

"Harvesters" Men's Mornings at Saint Vincents

Our vision is to empower and equip men to be the best fathers, sons, and brothers we can be, follow-

ing the example of Jesus and our heavenly Father, through the power of the Holy Spirit. Meeting monthly in a small group, men support and encourage each other by building relationships in a relaxed, informal and supportive atmosphere. Fellowship is so crucial for our spiritual journeys. The ability to be supported, challenged and share at a deeper level allows us to grow as men and as Christians. We share, listen and pray by means of: Refreshments - sharing and social time; Prayer and song; Lectio Divina (a quiet, reflective reading of a scripture passage); Time for sharing (not teaching or bible study) just sharing and listening; prayer, intercessory or for each other, with a song to end. What's In A Name?

By special request this is a new series, exploring some of the names and titles used in the Catholic Church. Have you ever wondered what is the difference between a Dean and a Canon? Or what a Papal Nuncio or Vicar General do? Follow this series to find out!

2: "Lector", "Acolyte" and "Catechist"

These three are grouped together because they are the three "commissioned" lay ministries in the church. While in the past these were among the so -called "minor orders" that candidates for the priesthood received on their journey to ordination, nowadays they are full lay ministries. Lectors are readers specially commissioned by the Bishop, whose special ministry is the proclamation of the Word of God; acolytes (from a Greek word meaning "attendant") are ministers of the altar - not just altar servers (as the title was once used), but also ministers of holy communion, again specially commissioned by a Bishop. And finally catechists are lay people commissioned to teach and guide people preparing for the Sacraments. These commissioned lay ministries are very common in Mission territories, but are not so common here in England, though following Pope Francis' direction we may be seeing these special ministries in our Diocese soon!

NEXT SUNDAY'S GOSPEL

Luke 2:22-32

When the time came for their purification according to the Law of Moses, the parents of Jesus brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the Law of the Lord, 'Every male who first opens the womb shall be called holy to the Lord') and to offer a sacrifice according to what is said in the Law of the Lord, 'a pair of turtledoves, or two young pigeons.' Now there was a man in Jerusalem, whose name was Simeon, and this man was righteous and devout, waiting for the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was upon him. And it had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Christ. And he came in the Spirit into the Temple, and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him according to the custom of the Law, he took him up in his arms and blessed God and said, 'Lord, now you are letting your servant depart in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation that you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and for glory to your people Israel.'

Home Communions

Marriage

...is also by appointment. Please take an information leaflet from the porch and return the tear-off portion to arrange an interview. Please do not make bookings before this interview and note that six months' notice is required.

Anointing of the Sick

Please call the Presbytery to ask for this Sacrament. It should not be left until the last minute, but the sick should celebrate this sacrament to receive God's healing and comfort.

Confirmation and First Holy Communion

Registration for First Communion next year is closed, as the program has begun. Children baptised in the Catholic Church in **Year 8** but NOT at Catholic High School, please ask Father James for registration forms for Confirmation.

Our Parish S.V.P.


